 - that the Committee be included amongst the Committees to which Part III of the Act, dated 5th March, 1946, under the Committees of the States (Jersey) Law, 1946, applied (it being provided under the said Part III hat no member of the States shall be el-gible as the President of more than one Committee to which that Part applies or as a member of two such Committees; and, accordingly, approved a draft Act entitled "Act, dated 17th October, 1961, under the Committees of the States (Jersey) Law, 1946".

THE STATES further approved -

- The preparation of legislation authorizing the acquisition, if necessary by compulsory BONE purchase, on behalf of the public, of land for any purpose which accorded with a development plan approved by the States;
