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




Metaphor 1: A mountain of evidence!

Palliative Care

- Some speakers consider palliative care and assisted dying to be mutually exclusive, or that access to good, well-funded palliative care removes the need for assisted dying
- Others argue that good palliative care and assisted dying can and should co-exist, and that individuals can benefit from access to both

Palliative Care

- The question you have been asked as a Jury relates specifically to whether or not assisted dying should be introduced in Jersey
- Consideration of the provision of palliative care in Jersey is a separate matter (beyond the scope of the Jury)
- However, it may be a matter you choose to note in your recommendations for further consideration by Government of Jersey

Professional registration

Re-read the **letter from Alex and Suzanne** (29 April), after discussions with the Government of Jersey, who spoke with the GMC (General Medical Council)

The key messages in the letter follow...

Professional registration

- It is not necessarily the case that a Jersey registered doctor, who assisted in the death of a patient, would be considered "unfit to practice", provided that assisted dying was legal in Jersey
- The GMC is willing to discuss this further, if Jersey opts to allow assisted dying in some form
- And, if that is the case, Gov Jersey will also have discussions with other key registration bodies for nurses (NMC) and pharmacists (HCPC)
