

# Types of evidence

You are receiving evidence from:

- 1) One another
- 2) Witnesses including researchers, healthcare professionals, advocates, people with experience



## What speakers are saying

Think about:

- 1) What are the **key points**?
- 2) Is there **good evidence or a good argument** to back up the point?
- 3) Why might someone take a **different view**?
- 4) If **speakers disagree**, why is this the case?

### How we listen (being aware of biases)

Keep an **open mind** and give everyone a **fair hearing** 

Things to **be mindful of**...

We listen well to <b>good presenters</b> and to <b>people "like us"</b>	But others can offer valuable insights
We hear things that <b>fit what we</b> think	But there may be more to consider
Stories move us more than <b>numbers</b>	But the numbers can be important
We want to <b>be liked</b>	But the "herd" might be wrong
We best remember <b>what we heard</b> last	But earlier insights might be valuable
