Notes were made of questions asked at workshops, public meetings and school meetings to ensure a full record was kept of concerns that have been raised. The questions are paraphrased or summarised where necessary and are not repeated verbatim.

The questions have not been counted as formal consultation responses because in most cases the individuals who asked them were doing so as research before completing the online survey or an A5 response card.

Comments made as part of the submissions have been included but without names or identifying details. Only two comments have been omitted either because they were inappropriate or defamatory and two because they referred to private legal issues.

## **SPORTS GROUPS MEETING - Notes**

Les Quennevais School Drama studio - 7pm on Wednesday 30 September 2015 Audience: 36 representatives of sports groups.

## Question 1 - Peter Bastion, Jersey Petanque Club.

Pétanque club been there for 20 years. One of concerns is parking. At the moment the configuration comes close to our terrain but under Option 1 it would be much further away and would not give the access we need. Area on the Railway Walk. Our site has a school playground on one side and a pitch on the other and the area is limited. We overflow onto those. We support the need for a new school.

#### Question 2 - Steve Le Monnier, Jersey Softball representative and former parent.

New school long overdue.

Normally when you have options there is usually one stinker and this was Option 1 until I heard about putting the hospital on People's Park. This is not an open site, it's a step too far. Cycle track will be decimated. We will have a lot of people with sporting aspirations fighting over a small area of land. People who come over are amazed at the facilities. Les q is a jewel in the crown. Lots of people use it.

Confused about Options 2 and 3 as Option 2 looks like a good proposal but Option 3 gives you more land. Would the design for Option 3 be different?

## Question 3 - Barry Cameron, Jersey Cycling Association.

Option 1 is an unnecessary compromise between investing in education and sport. Just had a really successful Island Games and Commonwealth. Should be investing in both. This compromise would not achieve either. This site is compromised and there isn't enough expansion room - will have to go further into sports areas. What will happen when our children are older?

## Question 4 - Phil Austin, Jersey Football Association.

No one disagrees that we need a new school. It's where it's going to go.

The States have a strategy for increasing participation in sport and are trying to do that at the back of the Island Games. Sport is an easy touch. We used St Martin pitch and the pitch next to St George's school - both clubs are nearly gone. Have to think really carefully. Where will tennis etc be relocated to? Until you can tell us that it's very much an open debate.

Not just the loss of a pitch it's the loss of clubs that have been in the community for a long time. St Brelade must be very concerned.

## **Question 5 -** Steve Lowethorpe, Cycling Association.

Even a reduction in that track would be very significant in the kind of events we could put on. British Cycling affiliated events could not be held if we lose 400-500m. How much is it really going to cost? It's an important part of people's decision making.

## **Question 6 -** Chris Minty, Jersey Cricket.

No one doubts the school is needed. I don't think the loss of facilities has been properly quantified or explained. It will not just be pitch. Each sport should set out what they've lost. It's been glossed over. We will certainly be responding in writing on that basis. It's not just one pitch. It's an international croquet pitch. Cricket has not really been mentioned. We are due to move but would make it difficult to play because of danger to cyclists.

## Question 7 - Gavin Fraser, Jersey Football Association.

Point well made. Option 1 just out of the question even if you take the access to that road it's out of the question. The question that should come across is the loss of community facilities. Other two are fairly similar - the big difference is the loss of the community club and people really get behind that. The only real option is opt 2 good access and do not disrupt a community club.

## Question 8 – Jersey Triathlon Association official.

Diff for us to do events because she have three sports. Les q is the only places especially for juniors that we can out on an event that has a swim cycle and run. It's difficult to get the booking anyway because it's so well used. No other cycle track so it's the only venue we can use.

## Question 9 - Richard Le Lievre, Jersey Hockey.

Trying to develop a hockey centre behind the pitch. This option completely kyboshes it. Want to share with softball and do something for the community. Land at east end for warm up removed. Stops us bringing competitors over. If there was a sporting clubhouse up there it would enhance every sporting club up there. We have plans to do something special up there but a school kyboshes it.

## Question 10 - Les Mielles Tennis Club representative.

Based up at Les Quennevais for 40 years. 12 months ago had all the courts refurbished at great cost. 288 members mostly juniors, mostly from St Brelade and most who will go to Les Quennevais school. Our club room provides catering facilities for other clubs. Nucleus for the parish. School will go right on top of it. Don't want to lose football pitch also. If Option 1 is chosen will everything be moved and put in place before the site is levelled? A gap of no facilities for nine to12 months would completely destroy the clubs for the children. Negotiation with States to take over the whole site on a nine year lease. Also done a lot of work on clubhouse too.

## Question 11 - Dave Maine, St Brelade Sports & Social Club.

We have been based in the community for over 50 years on that site for 15 years. It's part of the community and been building a strong youth section. Imperative that there is a new school. There are a lot of practical difficulties with Option 1 site and from the sporting point of view. We are very concerned because we feel we have built something up there and trying to relocate it to elsewhere is the parish will have an effect. That pitch provides a natural barrier between the back end of Belle Vue and the cemetery. Clubhouse opened in 1998-2000.

## Question 12 - Neville Davidson, Jersey Football Association.

Where would it be relocated? St Martin were promised a pitch across the road and never got it. That could go on for years.

## Question 13 - Jersey Croquet Club official.

Only a small club but the only one in the Island and if we got closed down we would never get back again. We have European championships. It would take a number of years to get the pitches back to the same condition as they are now. There's no other croquet club. Just hoping that we won't be elbowed out.

## Question 14 – Jersey Softball official.

Option 1 - we hope it won't happen. Are you going to offer alternative venues in the interim? Point of fact - a lot of people being squished into a smaller area. A lot of people competing for the same limited resource.

## Question 15 - Barry Cameron, Jersey Cycling Association.

Nobody has actually got the cumulative numbers of sports people using that field. Just cycling alone is 40 races and 40 competitors each time - 800 alone. Juniors every Wednesday. Thousands of others. This has evolved over many years into a prime sporting facility. There is nowhere else for these clubs to go that's comparable because of the way it's evolved.

## **Question 16 -** Duty Manager, Les Quennevais Sports Centre.

Understand the need for the school - more housing and more children. You'll be wanting to use our playing fields. So why would you want to nick any of it when it could be used for keeping people fit. It always seems to be the sport that suffers. Will you take it out of the curriculum?

## Question 17 - Manager, Les Quennevais Sports Centre.

Safeguarding issues in a shared premises with members of the public coming in when a school is in progress. Haute Vallee is used but it's limited and the only people who use it in school time are Les Amis. The public access Les Quennevais sports facilities all the time. Also loss of income from events and hiring out of facilities because the school would take them up. Figures on parking at the front: main car park has 138 standard spaces, 11 disabled and 9 parent and child. Already get complaints. Most spaces will be filled by school staff. Usage peaks different to the UK. First peak at 10am for Exercise Referral and bowls club. Coincide with school start times. People in properties are senior citizens enjoying a quiet time of life so huge change for them.

#### Question 18 Carlo Riva, Bosdet Trust (Les Ormes).

Pretty relaxed about Options 2 and 3. Any plans for cycle track along Rue Carree with connectivity though Les Ormes and a cycle route through to St Ouen's bay? We would be very supportive of any road widening.

#### **Question 19** Steve Le Monnier

My daughter transferring to Les Quennevais in 2019. Will this school be built?

## **Question 20** Barry Cameron, Jersey Cycling Association.

Are all the sites suitable for building on? No hidden holes etc?

#### Question 21 - Les Mielles Tennis.

If you go to Planning will you get approval for 2 and 3? Are they viable options?

What's the process and who makes the decision?

## Question 23 - Steve Le Monnier

Do you have to choose an option? Can you say none and just submit comments? Rear car park has 65 upper and lower 40 cars.

## **Summary by Director of Education:**

Everyone here agrees we need a new school but not option 1.

Five key themes have emerged:

- Reduction in facilities.
   Restricting and disrupting the facilities that have taken years to develop will undermine the community and not just serious sporting people.

- Traffic access through busy area and this will be an issue.
   Parking concerns.
   There are ambitious plans from various associations to develop on the current site.

## **PUBLIC MEETING – Notes** (Not verbatim record)

Les Quennevais School Drama studio - 8 October 2015 Approx 75-80 people

## **Question 1**

Le Rocquier and Grainville. Both used and maximised existing site. Want massive reassurance that max use of current site has really been looked at and discarded. Single storey of existing building. The public should know if it really has been exhausted.

#### Question 2

Expansion - how many students would it be able to take? 1.000?

#### Question 3

(Owner of property looking out onto 2 and 3.)

No issue with need for a new school but concerned about the cost and grandiose schemes concern taxpayers in current climate. Concerned about road parallel to Route de Quennevais. Field recently sold and explicit that condition could never be built on.

Already evident that it's a very busy road with traffic too fast so wouldn't oppose a school if it slowed the traffic. Latest states buildings close to the road have completely destroyed the image of that road. Totally detrimental to the area and bringing noise to all the properties. If it is to be viable it needs to be away from the existing football pitch and further towards the sand dunes than the main road.

## **Question 4 -** Resident near Options 2 & 3. Field owner.

Genuine interested have always been to keep some green lungs in the parish. Realistic point of view that by using Option 2 or 3 and putting a school in the middle of green land is possibly the best option for that land. I am absolutely convinced that if a school doesn't go on that site we will see an application for housing - social consequences possibly a lot worse than putting a school in.

#### **Question 5**

Aware of the issues and frank about loss of sports facilities. Question - which of these sites allows you to build a building that gives our children the best educational opportunities that they can receive?

#### **Question 6**

Thank you for allowing us to have this consultation. There isn't any doubt we need a new Les Quennevais school. We needed one 15 years ago. Site 1 - I could not agree to sports field being taken. Current school could be used for parking and it can be connected to Blanche Banques. It's a waste area at the moment. It is a site of special interest - but there's not much interest - but area is there. Site 3 I couldn't support. The sports club have done so much work and the clubhouse they almost built themselves. That leaves us with Site 2 which is the preferred option. I must admit that if this site were suggested six months ago I would have objected. When you came into the site there was a lovely green area with cows grazing as you came into the parish. Since then we have a big apartment block on a small park area. I wonder how many people knew it was going to be so big. I do not feel that a school built there would detract, in fact I think a school on the south of the site would enhance and would leave a green area before Rue Carree. I hope the design would be something to look at. It would soften the design of the large buildings going up there now. One thing that worries me is the traffic. It's a real problem for all those who live I. The area. I hope we can get some reassurance from the Constable that the parish will look at the impact of more traffic in this area. I wish you luck.

#### **Question 7**

(St. Peter parishioner member of sporting club with keen interest in option 1.)

We thought there was no way they would use Option 1 but the presentation was scary. More balanced this time. Want to see the school redeveloped - son been here daughter coming. Delighted to see Option 1 not getting much credence. Thought Option 3 was best. Now think Option 2 is best. Using Option 1 is too high a price to pay. More clubs fighting for less space and many cannot coexist. There will be more pressure on that site. Football club should not give up their land. Don't think people realize Option 1 is not in the green zone. Will there be a problem with planning?

#### **Question 8**

Option 2 looks an excellent idea. Very sure few people would object to a new school. Was chair of the one school refurbishment in 1996 and it was a nightmare. You can never put the school and teachers though it again. Concerned about traffic and light pollution. Traffic survey last year in February/March so need another one. Diagram has no allowance for a right hand turning. Exit would presumably be left only. Could do something with that area such as a roundabout at junction. Impact so much less on residents down that road.

#### **Question 8 supplementary**

You need to have the residents in that area on board because they could make or break. Also consider light pollution.

#### **Question 9**

(Don Farm resident)

Do not want Option 1. Fond of Les Quennevais School - my children came here. If you go for Option 1 you move it from one estate to another. Traffic coming out onto that road at peak times is horrendous at peak times. Do not want to lose the sports facilities that are so fantastic. It would be lost and that would be such a sad thing to do.

#### **Question 10**

(Daughter at school and one coming, also a bus driver for route 15.)

Having been sat in the traffic the impact will lessen further up to this end of Les Quennevais. 99 percent of traffic comes from the airport. Also look at pedestrian underpass for children to get across the main road. Some use Railway Walk.

#### **Question 11**

Getting the feeling that Option 2 is least bad. Came in not knowing which is best. Can Jersey Property Holdings confirm that the foot print is realistic?

#### **Question 12**

(Cycling representative)

Shortening of the track does give us considerable concern in terms of running races. It would make it very difficult for us. Other sports quite compact. If want to replicate the track elsewhere I struggle to see where that could be. Against Option 1

#### **Question 13**

(Route des Quennevais resident for whole life)

Would be devastated if Option 1 went ahead to lose those facilities would not be a progressive move. I don't see the point of taking away St Brelade pitch therefore whole heartedly in favour of Option 2.

## **Question 14**

(Resident of Les Quennevais for over 50 years)

Option 2 looks like the best. See booklet Page 6 - present size and minimum need for a new school. How exactly do the sites meet these needs? Are we being too short-sighted having just a minimum size? Should we have three storeys and not just the minimum area?

#### **Question 15**

(Ex-student, parent of future student and member of staff.)

Fully support Option 2. Would like to see it pushed back off the road. Concerned about parking and traffic. Need to be realistic - it's a school, there's traffic. That can't be a realistic reason for not putting a school there.

## **Question 16**

Any point is strengthening the roof because in 50 years' time when none of us are here may need to build another storey.

#### **Question 17**

(House backs on to railway walk and pitch.)

Prefer Option 2 with the break and gives the school space. The green space of Option 1 is what people buy their houses for.

## Question 18

Definitely Option 2 because this doesn't have an impact on any other facilities. Has any thought been given to cost of relocating facilities that would be lost? Would that be offset by cost of purchasing land at Option 2

## **Question 19**

Assurance from the panel that given amount of money taxpayers would have to fund through the taxes are you considering best possible renewable energy use.

## **Question 1**

Proposed build area 50 percent greater than existing school but increase in pupils is only 25 per cent. Is it being built for a much greater increase in future?

## **Question 1 supplementary**

That has happened over a number of years. The proposal for increase of building is bigger than the increase in student nos.

#### **Question 2**

You are expecting to increase the size of classrooms so how many students in them and how many square feet per student?

#### **Question 3**

Former pupil, children go there and used to work there. Keen to see it rebuilt because it's not fit for purpose. Main concern is that if you've looked for so long for a site, the corner it's been offered seems incredible when the west of Jersey is so big. Why does it have to be built in a busy area near an airport? I live nearby and can't sit in my garden. Then you have the pollution of the airport - have had tests done. And I've heard that alongside the pitch there will be new warehouses and hangars. Feel very sad - the former Constable had a great site and housing was built on it. Les Quennevais School deserves more. What is going to happen to the intrusion of the graveyard there now? It hasn't been considered by anyone. Why when it's taken so long to find somewhere is this the best you can offer?

## **Question 3 supplementary**

Workmen have told me they will be building there [south of existing airport buildings]. At the beginning there was an assurance there would be nothing there and looks what's being built.

## **Question 3 supplementary**

Would be a shame if you could not expand in future.

#### **Question 4**

I was told by the cricket association that they used to have a pitch near the airport and stopped using it because of pollution and moved to les q.

## **Question 5**

Is there an anticipation that the school will move towards a sixth form to alleviate congestion in St Helier?

## Question 6

Interesting comments and the Head made a good speech. I remember the school being built and rumours abounded about all the wonderful facilities and modern equipment being provided. Safety around sites wasn't a big consideration at the time and people could be seen looking in the windows. Most of the school in the area was virgin land and the school was built to accommodate the growing numbers. Les Quennevais School is a success story but the building has had its day. Staff have done a wonderful job in very difficult circumstances. It's been very difficult to find a site in the built up areas. I would not support the use of Option 1 the site has a lot of gorse and dumped materials. Site 3 I would not support because of the work that's been put in to building up St Brelade social club. That leaves Option 2. If this has come up six months ago I and many others would have opposed it. There was a lovely path and tree lined park. Now as you come from St Peter there are large blocks, some three stories that have replaced it. Now I do not feel the building of a new school would damage the area. A beautiful new schools would enhance it. I am glad the school is along the south of the site to maintain green area along Rue Carree. Cemetery - I was involved in finding that site and there is another field so that we have expansion room for the future. Downside is a traffic problem. There is going to be a big increase on Route de Quennevais and all roads that feed in. It is already bad enough. This will be a problem for all those in Les Quennevais and Le Coin. I'm sure this will be addressed. I do now support the new school and am sure it will be big enough to accommodate the growing population. Wish them all the very best and look forward to seeing it.

Support you [JPH] in that. I went to a school like that and it was a pain, a nuisance. It would be an absolute nightmare for the school and parents.

#### **Question 13**

What about sticking a school at the end of a runway?

Support new school but 40 million is an awful lot of money. Les Quennevais has waited such a long time and I hope they don't have second best just for the sake of having a news school. Sad if it's not the best of taxpayers' money.

I was expecting more and different kinds of sites. There are basically only two to choose from. One is virtually the same site. You said you looked at 17 sites.

Adding to that, the noise and disruption to the occupants in the nearby houses. • At present, the parking facilities are adequate for the activities run by the existing sports facilities. If Option 1 were chosen, without increasing the parking, it would result in more traffic congestion and roadside parking on the access roads. • Under Option 1 our club would be relocated in its entirety to the area where the Croquet Club is currently situated. Other sports clubs that use the facilities would have their activities compromised and in some cases curtailed. (On this note we don't support Option 3, which takes away St Brelade FC pitch). • The tennis courts have recently been resurfaced at a cost of approximately £10,000 per court. We have four courts, and in addition to ours, there are two public courts adjacent to ours, which have also been resurfaced by States of Jersey. Therefore the total cost to the States is approximately £60,000. With the new surfaces having a lifespan of about 10 years, it would be a huge waste of taxpayers' money to dig up the courts and relocate after only one year, with all the costs that involves. • Maintaining the existing tennis facility on this site is important to us. We have been relocated at Les Quennevais for almost 25 years and provide community tennis for all age groups and abilities and feel that any move from our existing site would be disruptive to the club and community. • We estimate that during the course of an average week 150 members attend organised activities at the Club, this doesn't include casual use of the courts by our members, of which we have approximately 220. \*In addition to the recent court resurfacing costs, over the last 2 years the facing at the club has also been replaced. On behalf of the Jersey Softball Association (JSA),

whilst we do not dispute the building of such a new school, I am writing to express concern in how Option 1 is being portrayed to members of the public. In that it is being described in meetings, that the JSA has attended, as "a loss of a single pitch". This, we feel, is clearly not true as the proposed re-development would take out a significant amount of the existing playing field. Resources displaced by the proposed redevelopment would then have to be situated in the remaining and greatly diminished facilities thus reducing them even further. This would then have an adverse effect on the clubs and associations who currently use the playing fields as they would then have to complete for usage of this greatly diminished resource. It is clear from the JSA perspective that some sporting activities would not be able to coexist or "field share" should this go ahead. Please see our arguments against option 1 as listed below: 1. Reduces the facilities by at least half; 2. Losing some of these facilities will result in all sports having to compete for the use of the remaining resources - resulting in lots of clashes particularly in the summer, there are also the additional problems with health and safety meaning some of these sporting activities cannot field share. Currently softball needs 2 pitches booked in plenty of time for their summer season to meet the demands of its members; 3. During the summer months from May to the end of August - the JSA has 4 games playing regularly every Sunday on both the current pitches involving a total of 8 teams of approximately 120 players (not taking into account umpires, scorers and supporters) This can rise to 6 games. 4. Every Wednesday there is the independent Corporate league during the months of June and July. Each week 4 games utilise both pitches for approximately 120 players. Currently the Corporate League is oversubscribed and the JSA has been approached to provide more facilities; 5. The JSA has approximately 300 members; 6. Alternate years Jersey hosts the inter-Island and Upton matches vs Guernsey. 2016 is Jersey's turn to host these matches. This involves 4 Jersey teams, plus coaches, scorers and supporters plus 4 Guernsey teams with their coaches, scorers and supporters on the current pitch 1 on either Saturday and/or Sunday. Guernsey usually choose to make a weekend of it therefore all their coaches, scorers and supporters will be there on both days; 7. The JSA has recently resurrected their slowpitch softball tournament and in the past this has involved the use of our main pitch 1 (the current one with the fence); the use of the cricket pitch at the bottom and both pitches on the top field. (Cricket relinquishes use of the pitches to softball for this weekend (over 2 days Saturday and Sunday - in the past in May but could be moved to further on within the summer). Softball relinquishes use of certainly our current pitch 1 when crichet has a tournament or another sport has a major games on weekends. Should the construction go ahead then the JSA will no longer be able to hold such tournaments at Les Quennevais - a site and grounds which UK teams say are the best they play on all summer; 8. Loss of parking during construction and no doubt later. Plus currently the JSA has been asked not to park anywhere near or in Don Farm; 9. Access to Les Quennevais will be via a housing estate - Don Farm. The report states that the school is currently situated in the middle of a large residential development with small roads that make vehicular access difficult. SHOULD a new school be built on Les Quennevais playing fields vehicular access will be through another large housing estate i.e. Don Farm thus once again making access difficult; 10. During construction of a new school should Option 1 be the site chosen this will involve lots of sports not being able to continue for the duration of construction. It was mentioned that the fields would be prepared first so sports could resume their respective sporting activities but in the interim the JSA wishes to know if there are plans to accommodate not only Softball but other sports at other venues on the Island. 11. As part of the SOJ Fit for the Future campaign the JSA is looking to run youth and young adult tournaments to accommodate younger players who have been encouraged to play in our trial sessions who cannot participate in the current adult orientated league. The loss of resources at Les Quennevais is going to put this under serious strain; 12. To summarise - constructing a major building on such fantastic sporting facilities and to take away a large portion of these sporting facilities to the detriment of the sporting community is not at all feasible. It is also very contradictory to the States plans for Fit for the Future trying to encourage adults and youngsters to be fitter and play a sport - this will not happen if half of the best sporting facilities on the Island are taken away. Each sport is trying to encourage new members and this is not likely to happen. I confirm that our members support Option 2 for this re-development. A pedestrian path could go inside the existing hedges. • There is already an orchard on the Rue Carree. Nut trees for squirrels? • The cemetery, football field and new housing estate do not appear to be clearly shown and at

present children visit the Precinct after school, • Would noise affect burial services in the cemetery? • Many people including myself will greatly regret and object strongly to the loss of the agricultural land which I understand is the subject of a restrictive covenant.
