SECTION 1 OIntroduction

Young Inpatients Survey 2012 States of Jersey Health & Social Services

Background to the survey

The results presented here are from the Paediatric Inpatients Survey 2012, carried out by Picker Institute Europe on behalf of States of Jersey Health & Social Services. The purpose of the survey is to understand what young inpatients think of the healthcare services provided by your Trust, in order to inform service improvements. Both paediatric inpatients and their parents/carers were invited to give their feedback.

Survey Development

Two existing paediatric inpatient questionnaires from the voluntary 2008 Young Inpatients Survey were revised by the Picker Institute Europe in 2010, in collaboration with Sheffield Children's Hospital and Birmingham Children's Hospital. One survey was originally aimed at paediatric inpatients aged 5yrs+, and the other was aimed at the parents/carers of paediatric inpatients aged 0-4yrs. The age range of the children's questionnaire was increased from 5yrs+ to 8yrs+ for the 2010 survey to maximise child involvement and completion. The children's survey was made motivating to young patients by amending question phrasing, making the text more child-friendly, inserting illustrations and colour, and changing the overall layout. The questionnaires were cognitively tested in Oxfordshire during April and May 2010 on young hospital inpatients and their parents/carers, and amended according to the feedback received. These new versions of the paediatric inpatient survey were originally conducted in 2010 with 27 NHS Trusts, repeated in 2011 with 12 Trusts, and have recently been conducted again for 15 Trusts this year.

Questionnaires

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Two questionnaire versions were used for the 2012 paediatric inpatient surveys:

- **Version 1 (P1) for parents/carers of inpatients aged 0-7yrs:** this was designed to be completed by the parent or carer who accompanied the child to hospital, with the input of the young patient if they were able.
 - **Version 2 (YP1) for children (paediatric inpatients) aged 8-17yrs:** this was designed to be completed by the young patient themselves, with some help from their parent or carer if needed. A short section at the end of the children's survey was designed to be completed by the parent or carer.

Survey methodology

A sample of 329 paediatric inpatients that were discharged from your trust was submitted. Of these patients, 189 were aged 7yrs or under at the time of sampling, and their parents/carers were sent the parents version of the questionnaire. The 140 patients aged 8yrs or above were sent the children's survey. The survey was undertaken using a postal questionnaire, sent to patients' home addresses, followed by two reminder mailings to non-responders. Surveys sent to inpatients aged 0-15yrs were addressed to their parent or guardian.

Patients were sent a questionnaire, a covering letter from the trust, a multiple language sheet offering help with the survey, and a FREEPOST envelope. Patients wishing to complete the survey filled it in and returned it to the Picker Institute in the FREEPOST envelope. Non-responders were sent a reminder card after 2-3 weeks and another questionnaire after a further 2-3 weeks. In addition to the paper version of the questionnaire, patients were also given the option to complete the survey online. The covering letters and reminder cards included a link to the online version of the questionnaire along with a unique online log-in code.

The Picker Institute ran a freephone helpline for patients who had any queries or concerns about the survey. This included links to LanguageLine with immediate access to interpreters in over 100 languages. Patients wishing to opt-out of the survey could do so by returning the questionnaire blank, or by calling the freephone helpline. They could also opt-out via the online version of the survey.

Using your Survey Results

We aim to help you to identify the key issues for improvement from the patient's perspective. We have presented the results in a number of ways to help you answer important questions about the survey results. This report has been designed to be used alongside our online results system:

Problem scores

At the Picker Institute, we use the concept of '**problem scores**' as a summary measure, to help monitor your results over time and to show how your Trust compares to the average score for all trusts who take part. We hope that you will find problem scores a helpful way of targeting areas in need of attention within your Trust – this in turn can help you to bring about real quality improvement for your patients.

What is a problem score?

The problem score shows the percentage of patients for each question who, by their response, indicated that a particular aspect of their care could have been improved. We have found this to be the simplest summary measure that focuses on quality improvement.

How are problem scores calculated?

We calculate the problem scores by combining the response categories. For example, for the following question '*Were you ever told different things by different people which left you feeling confused?*' we have combined the responses '*Yes, a lot*' and '*Yes, sometimes*', to create a single problem score. Asterisks on the frequency tables indicate which response categories have been combined to create the problem score:

EXAMPLE DATA ONLY:

T31 - (25) Were you ever told different things by different people which left you feeling confused?

The problem score for the above example would be interpreted as: 37% of survey respondents were told different things by different people.

Some questions were only asked to parents/carers, some were only asked to children, and other questions were asked to both parents/carers *and* young patients. These can be distinguished by the colour of the question:

- Questions asked to both parents/carers *and* to children are displayed in **black** text, as above.
- Questions asked to parents/carers only will be displayed in **blue** text
- Questions asked only to children will be displayed in red text

How should we use problem scores?

As the name suggests, problem scores indicate where there may be a problem within the trust, and may need further investigation. It is useful to keep in mind, that **lower scores reflect better performance**. Large problem scores should be highlighted as potential problem areas that need to be investigated. By targeting these areas, you can hopefully start to bring about real quality improvement to your patients. Problem scores are an **interpretation of the data** made by the Picker Institute. Any comparisons made within the Trust (internal benchmarks) or between trusts (external benchmarks) are made using these scores.

Targeted questions

In response to client feedback and in the interests of accuracy, we use derived questions to produce more meaningful scores for questions that **may not be applicable to all respondents**, but are not preceded by a filter question – in other words, all those that have a response code such as *I did not use a toilet*. The purpose is to produce more precise indicators of where the problems lie within the Trust. For each question of this nature we have therefore re-calculated the scores, **excluding those respondents to whom the question does not apply**. The new calculation will be illustrated in an **additional question (e.g. Q18+)**.

Question numbering and colour-coding

Throughout the report, questions and problem scores shown in **black** text represent data asked to both parents *and* children. Those in **red** text are for child-only data, whereas those in **blue** text are parent-only data.

For question numbering, the T number reflects the question number in the parent's survey, except for child-only data (displayed in red text). The number displayed in brackets represents the question number in the children's survey.

Low numbers of respondents

The questionnaire includes some filter questions, whereby only relevant questions are asked of patients. For example, patients that reported not having an operation or procedure would not be asked subsequent questions about operations. Furthermore, not all questions are asked to both parents *and* children, some are asked only to parents or only to children. This means that fewer patients will answer some of the questions in the questionnaire. Where fewer than 50 patients have answered a particular question, the problem score will be shown within square brackets, e.g. [43%]. If this is the case, the result should be treated with caution, as the number of patients answering is relatively small.

Confidence intervals

The survey undertaken was with a sample of patients. As the survey was not of all patients, the results may not be totally accurate. However, we can estimate the level of confidence we should have in the results. The table below shows the level of confidence we would have for various numbers of respondents.

Example: For a particular question, 300 patients responded, of which 25% answered 'yes'.

From the table above, we can see that for 300 respondents the confidence interval would be +/-4.9%. We would therefore estimate that the true results could be between 20.1% and 29.9%. However, if only 50 patients responded, and 25% answered 'yes', the confidence intervals would be +/-12% so the true result could be between 13% and 37%.

Significant differences

In the report we have identified questions where there are significant differences between your Trust and the 'Picker average' (the average score across the 15 trusts that took part), or between your Trust this year and your previous survey(s) (where this data is available). By 'significant' difference, we mean that the finding is statistically reliable and that the difference is likely to be 'real'. The calculation used to test the statistical significance of scores was the two-sample t-test.

Rounding of percentages

Note that throughout the report (with the exception of the Frequency Tables), partial percentages have been rounded to the nearest full number. For example 12.8% is rounded up to 13%, while 5.3% would be rounded down to 5%.

Historical Data

- There have been three previous Paediatric Inpatient surveys, one in 2004 (mandatory), one in 2008 (voluntary), one in 2010 (voluntary), and one in 2011 (voluntary).
- Where possible, comparisons have been made between the current 2012 survey and the previous inpatient surveys (for those who participated).
- Comparisons are only made on questions that can be directly compared (taking into account questionnaire changes).
- Please note that any historical comparisons must be **interpreted with caution** due to the changes in the target age group for each questionnaire:
 - In 2004 and 2008, the children's questionnaire was aimed at inpatients aged 5yrs+. This was increased to inpatients aged 8yrs+ for the 2010, 2011 and 2012 surveys.
 - In 2004 and 2008, the parent questionnaire was sent to parents/carers of inpatients aged 0-4yrs. This was altered to parents/carers of inpatients aged 0-7yrs for the 2010-2012 surveys.

The Picker Institute runs a **Freephone Helpline** for survey respondents. The lines were open from 8am-8pm Monday to Friday and Saturdays from 9am to midday. Your Trust received a total of 0 calls to the Freephone helpline.

About your respondents

A total of 329 young patients and parents from your Trust were sent a questionnaire. 328 were eligible for the survey, of which 154 returned a completed questionnaire, giving a response rate of 47%. The average response rate for the survey (across all Trusts) was 34%.

Key facts about your respondents:

- 51% were male; 48% were female and 1% did not reply.
- 56% of returned questionnaires were the parent/carer version, and 44% were the young patients' questionnaire.
- 93% stated their ethnic background as White; 4% Mixed; 0% Asian/Asian British; 1% Black/Black British; 1% Chinese or other ethnic group and 2% did not state their background.
- 67% of respondents were classed as inpatients and 33% were daycases.
- 50% of admissions were emergency whereas 47% of attendances were planned.
- Including the visit in question, 81% of paediatric inpatients had stayed in hospital on a ward just once, 16% two or three times, and 1% four times or more.

Overall ratings of Hospital Care

- 97% of young inpatients aged 8yrs+ rated their hospital care as excellent, very good or good, with 1% rating it as OK or bad.
- 99% of parents/carers rated their child's overall hospital care as excellent, very good or good, with 1% rating it as fair or poor.

Who answered the questionnaires?

- The parent's questionnaire was sent to the parent/guardian of young inpatients aged 0-7 yrs, and designed to be completed by the <u>parent or carer</u> who accompanied the child to hospital, with the input of the young patient if they were able.
- The children's questionnaire was sent to young inpatients aged 8-17 yrs. Section 1 was designed to be completed by the <u>child</u> themselves, with some help from their parent or carer if needed. Section 2 was designed to be completed by the parent or carer who accompanied the child to hospital.

The following questions were included in the questionnaires to show who answered the different surveys/sections. The percentage of questionnaires that were completed by the young patients or by their parent/carer are as follows:
