Consultation Summary Report

WHITE PAPER ON ISLAND PLAN REVIEW: DRAFT ISLAND PLAN

INTRODUCTION

The Island Plan is the main document determining planning policy for the Island. The States are committed to reviewing and revising the current plan to take account of pressing issues affecting the Island, such as the future direction of its economy, urban regeneration, the impact of our ageing population, the future of the Port and housing needs.

The draft Island Plan white Paper was designed to focus discussion on the strategic and detailed planning policies

The draft Plan is detailed in its coverage to ensure that the new Island Plan can be supported by evidence that all the significant issues were considered and consulted upon. The revised island plan must be backed up by sufficient and robust evidence and consultation to ensure that it meets the tests which independent scrutiny will consider it against.

This report summarises the findings of consultation events and activities undertaken between September 26th 2009 and March 31st 2010.

Consultation Process

The White Paper on the Island Plan Review: draft Plan was opened to public consultation on the 26th September 2009 and the consultation period was extended from 12 to 24 weeks by the Minister for Planning & Environment, ending on November 31st March 2010.

The White paper was launched at a press conference to the local press, radio and TV station and adverts were placed in the local paper and key public sites over the full consultation period. The policies in the white paper also generated a number of lead articles across all media outlets and this boosted the presence of the consultation event.

Over 250 hardcopies of the paper were sent out to States members, the public and interested parties.

A total of 215 consultees responded to the paper, generating a total of over 1100 responses to the questionnaire. The level of response to each area of the draft Plan needs to be taken into account when considering the results and ultimately the weight given to using the results in the writing of the re-drafting of the Plan.

Formal written consultation/leaflets

Notice that the consultation period had begun was sent on 26th September 2009 via email to all consultees on the States of Jersey consultee database.

A comments form and summary leaflet outlining the key policies and proposals was distributed and made available at the Planning Reception, States of Jersey customer call centre, Town Hall Reception, and the 11 parish halls and public library.

Availability of Documents


Copies of the draft Island plan and proposals map were made available for viewing at the Planning Reception, States of Jersey customer call centre, Town Hall Reception, and the 11 parish halls and public library from the 26th September 2009 to the close of the consultation period on 31st March 2010. Copies were also made available for purchase at £25.

Website

The draft Document was made available for download from a dedicated consultation website (www.consult.gov.je/dp) on 26th September 2009. Over the consultation period a total of 4,500 unique visits were made to the draft plan web site and a total of 165 comments were made online from both individuals and agents or organisations.

The paper was made available on the web through the development of a new dedicated States of Jersey public consultation portal (http:/consult.gov.je/portal). The site is designed to enable participants to read and print all of the relevant material, to respond to specific elements of the Plan, add their comments and to read the comments made by other respondents. In addition anybody registering on this web site will automatically receive this consultation response by email, together with any future details of subsequent consultation events, such as the publication of the white paper. Approximately 15% of all respondents used this method and in addition a large number of hits were registered on the site from those wishing to simply view the document and

read comments that were made in response to the questions posed (this does not require users to be registered).



Information on the Draft plan, with links to the consultation portal, were also put on the States of Jersey web site (gov.je) and this page was regularly updated with new information and revised documents for downloading as they became available.

Contact number/email/address

Contact details were provided on the document, website, summary leaflet, advertisements, posters and formal notification.

Media

A number of publications published articles on the draft Island plan and the principal ones are listed below;

The Jersey Evening post

Over 45 articles were published in the JEP over the consultation period and these generated a number of letters to the editor and on-line comments from members of the public.

Jersey Tourism - tourism week update

This weekly newsletter is distributed to approximately 2,000 email addresses and an article outlining the draft plan policies relating to tourism was placed in the 4th of December 2009 edition.¹

Jersey Consumer Council consumer News (issue 44 - March 2010)²

This newsletter is sent out by direct mail to over 38,000 households on the island and outlined the consultation event and provided the web site address.



Advertisements

Advertisements were placed in the JEP on 2 nights at the start of the consultation period.



Stakeholder Groups

A series 6 of topic based stakeholder meetings were held with key stakeholders such as other States department staff, States members, The National Trust for Jersey, Societe Jersiaise and Chamber of commerce. Each group received presentations summarising the draft policies and the intention of the meetings was to raise interest in the draft Plan, and allow the stakeholders to review the documents in detail, and return comments to the review team. The stakeholder groups were attended by a total of 120 people, mainly representing group and stakeholder interests.

Public Exhibitions

A series of 15 public exhibitions in each parish Hall (St. Helier had 3 meetings) were held during the consultation period and attended by approximately 300 members of the Public during the period in which a planning officer was available to answer questions.

MINISTER'S RESPONSE TO CONSULTATION

The draft Island Plan was published as a White Paper on 25 September 2009 and the consultation period was extended from an initial period of 3 months to six months, ending on 31 March 2010.

The plan sets out a number of key policies on planning for the future of the Island over the next 10 years, including policies to protect the Island's valuable and sensitive coast, countryside and heritage and to develop the town; whilst proposing policies that provide for new homes, jobs and business that we need if our economy and standard of living is to be maintained.

The consultation on the draft plan generated over 1100 comments from nearly 200 individuals and organisations and the Minister for Planning & Environment has now considered and responded to all of the comments. As a result of these, the Minister has made a number of proposed changes to the plan that will be put forward to the inspectors as part of the Examination in Public (EiP).

The Minister said:

"I am very pleased with the public level of response to the draft Island plan and I would like to thank all those who have taken the time and trouble to respond this important planning document.



Housing Need: The 2007 Housing Needs Survey coupled with population modelling based upon not im migration (+150 heads of household per year), mean that an additional 4,000 homes are required over the plan period, 2009-2018, (400 new dwellings per an-

Whilst the overall supply can meet the expected de-mand over the plan period, many Islanders cannot gain access to a home on the open market, and thus there remains a need 'affordable' homes, Indeed since 2002 only 17% of new homes have been 'lirst time buyer homes' and 17% social rented homes.

It is intended to meet the need with new homes from the following sources;

Short Term Plan Approach: In order to meet the immediate demand for affordable homes it is necessary to re-zone a small number of largely brown field

sites.

7 sites are proposed in the Plan for 'Category A hing' purposes. In total these sites will supply arou 200 homes that are needed in the short-term.

Longer Term Plan Approach: In order to avoid further re-zoning of land, whilst securing more affordable housing provision in the longer term, the Draft Plan sets out a new policy approach.

It is proposed that all development Sites with a capacity for two or more units will be required to provide a proportion of 40% affordable housing.

Other Key Housing Policies: The Draft Plan in-cludes policies that will be used to guarantee all resi-dential development proposals contain an appropriate 'mix' of housing rypes as needed. Furthermore if will ensure land is used more efficiently, with supple-mentary guidance setting minimum density standards taking into consideration local context.
