
## Social Security Department Registered Unemployed Individuals Actively Seeking Work (ASW) 30 June 2009

956 people were registered with the Department as unemployed and actively seeking work (ASW) on 30 June 2009. Of these 626 were men and 330 women.



The figure for June shows an increase of 91 from 865 in May.


Of the 956 people registered as ASW, 620 are currently receiving Income Support<sup>1</sup>.


The use of the learning area facilities has been steadily increasing with 838 sessions in June compared to 746 in May.




## Registered ASW by age

The charts below show the number of people registered as ASW by age as at 30 June 2009. 40% of those registered are aged 24 or below.












## **Duration as ASW**

The majority of people who register as ASW with the Social Security Department remain registered for less than 15 weeks. The chart below provides information on the periods of time people have been registered with the Department as at 30 June 2009.








It should be noted that the number of people registered with the department in June 2008 rose significantly as a result of targeting Income Support Jobseekers.

At the end of June 2009,111 vacancies were advertised on the Jobs in Jersey website (<a href="http://www.gov.je/jobs/">http://www.gov.je/jobs/</a>). This compares with 211 vacancies at the end of June 2008. During the month 281 new vacancies were posted, compared to 443 in June 2008. Although vacancies are running at a much lower level than this time last year, numbers have picked up since the beginning of 2009.



## **General Note**

It should be remembered that there is no statutory requirement for all unemployed residents of Jersey to register as actively seeking work with the Social Security Department. As such the data above is a useful indicator of the level of unemployment in the Island but it does not attempt to measure the actual rate of unemployment. This is undertaken on an annual basis through the Jersey Annual Social Survey.
