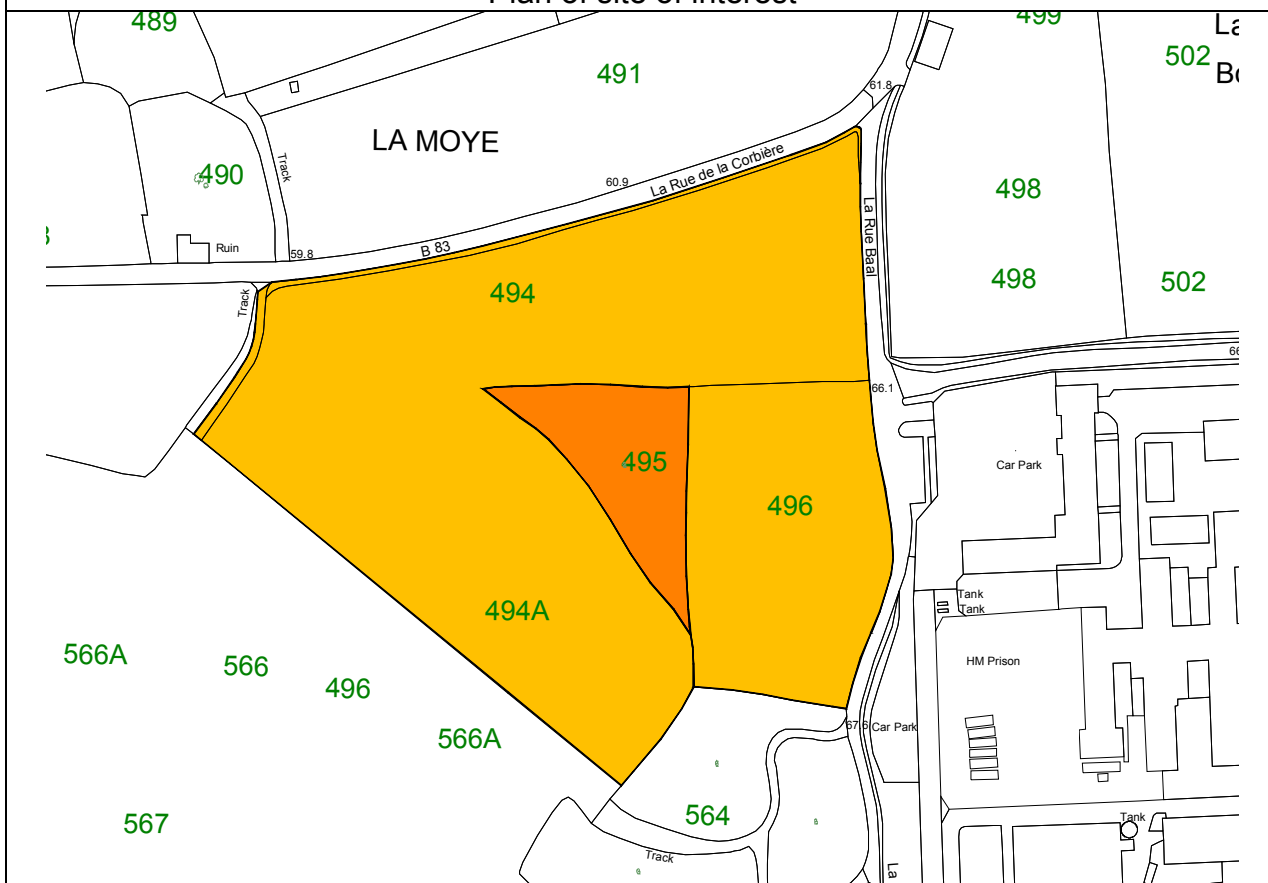

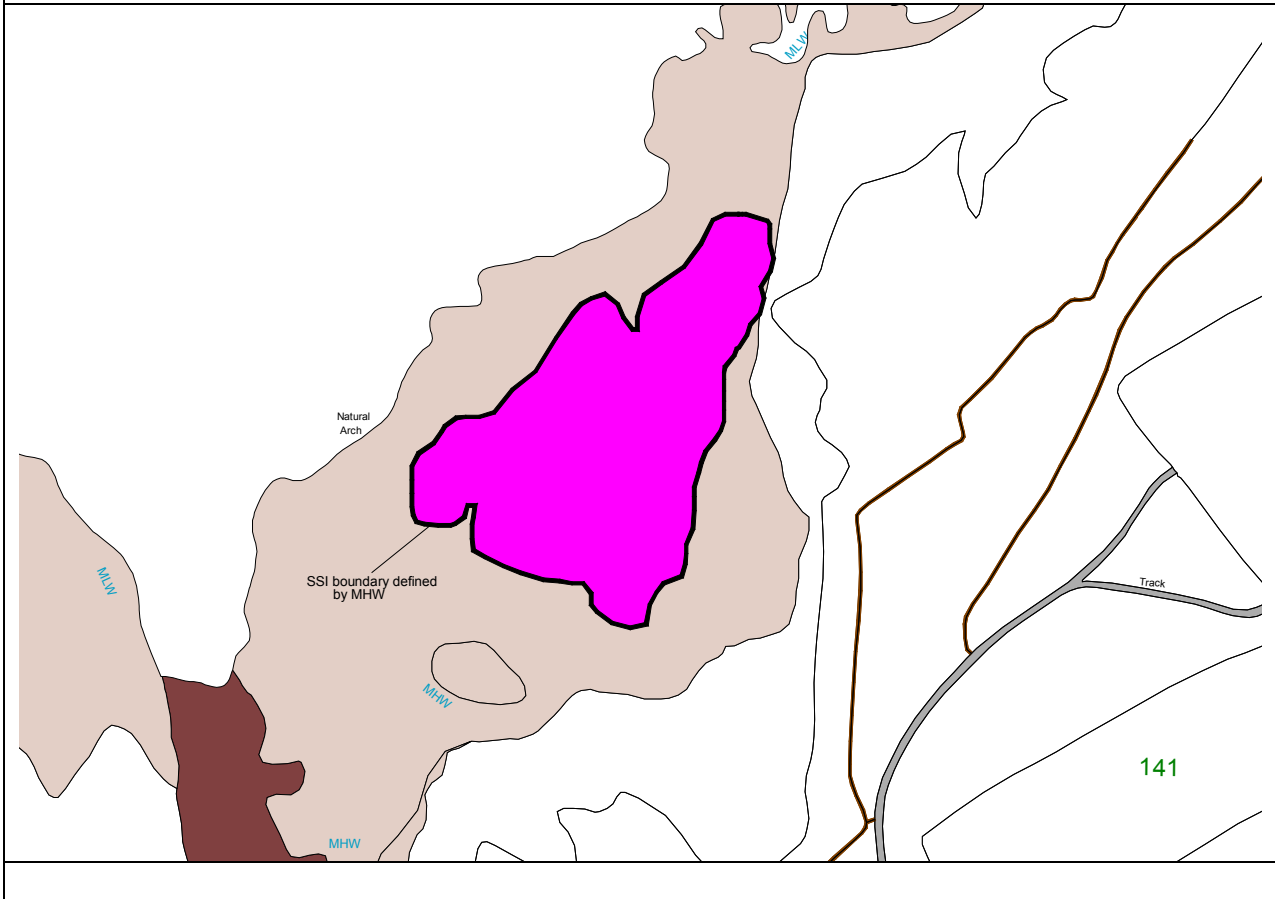
Plan of site of interest

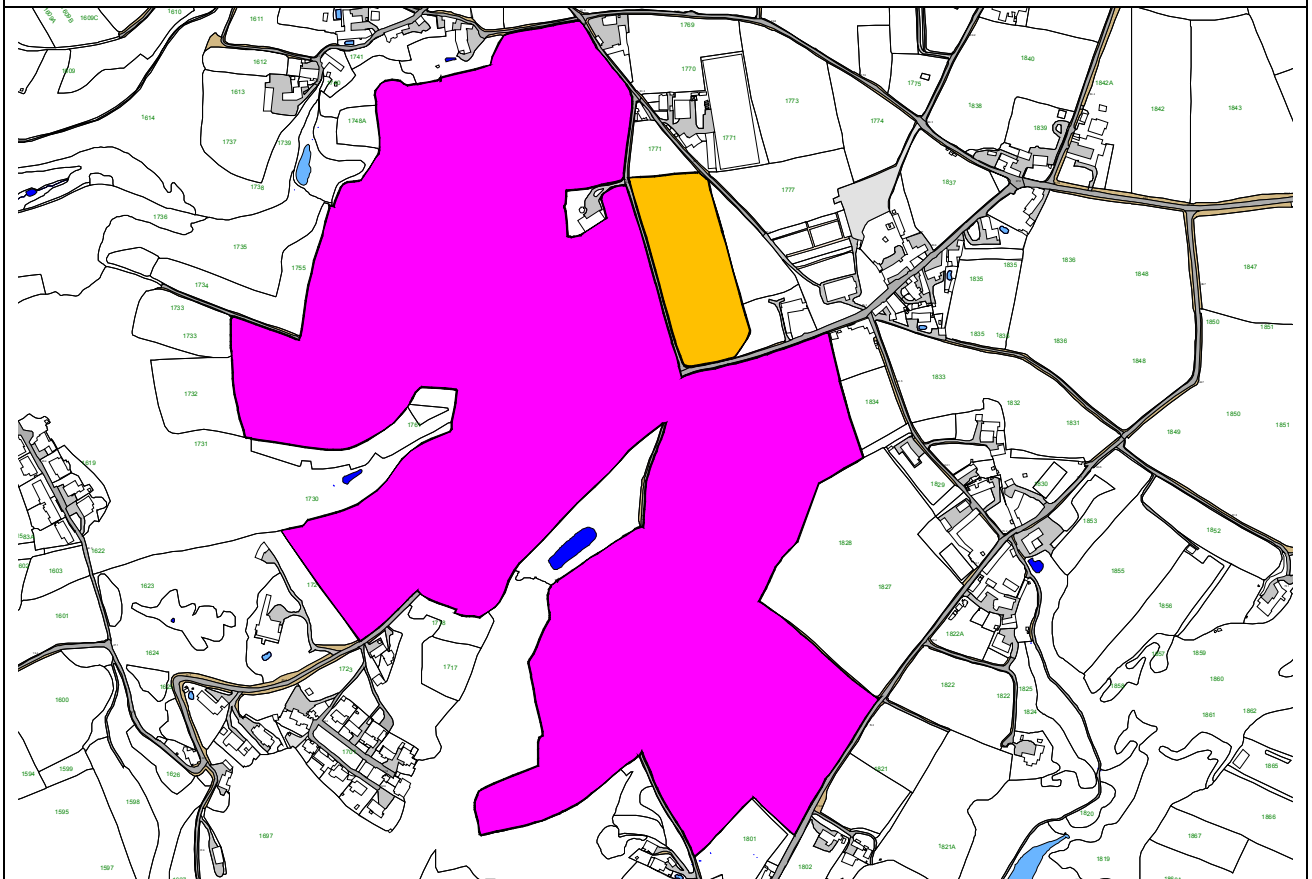
Plan of site of interest

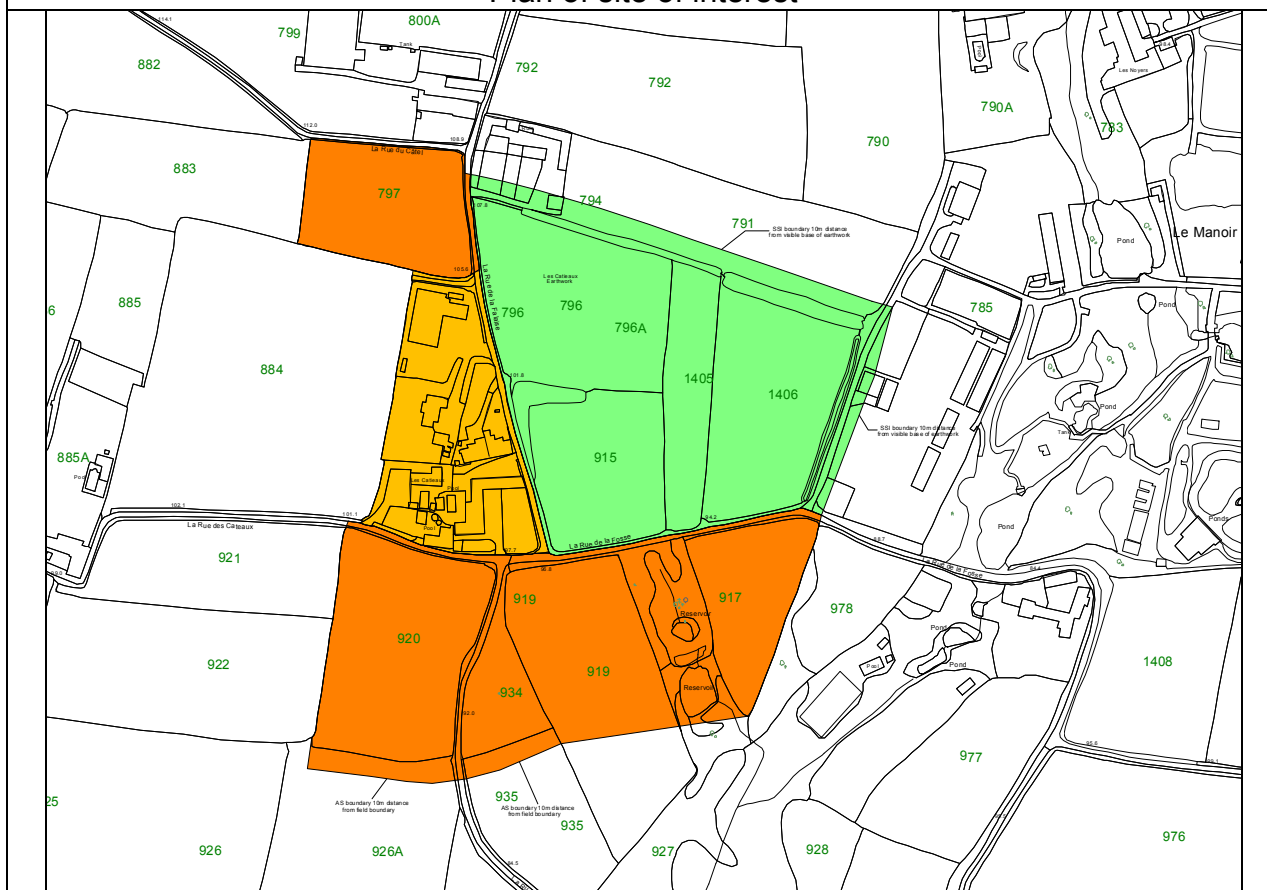
Plan of site of interest

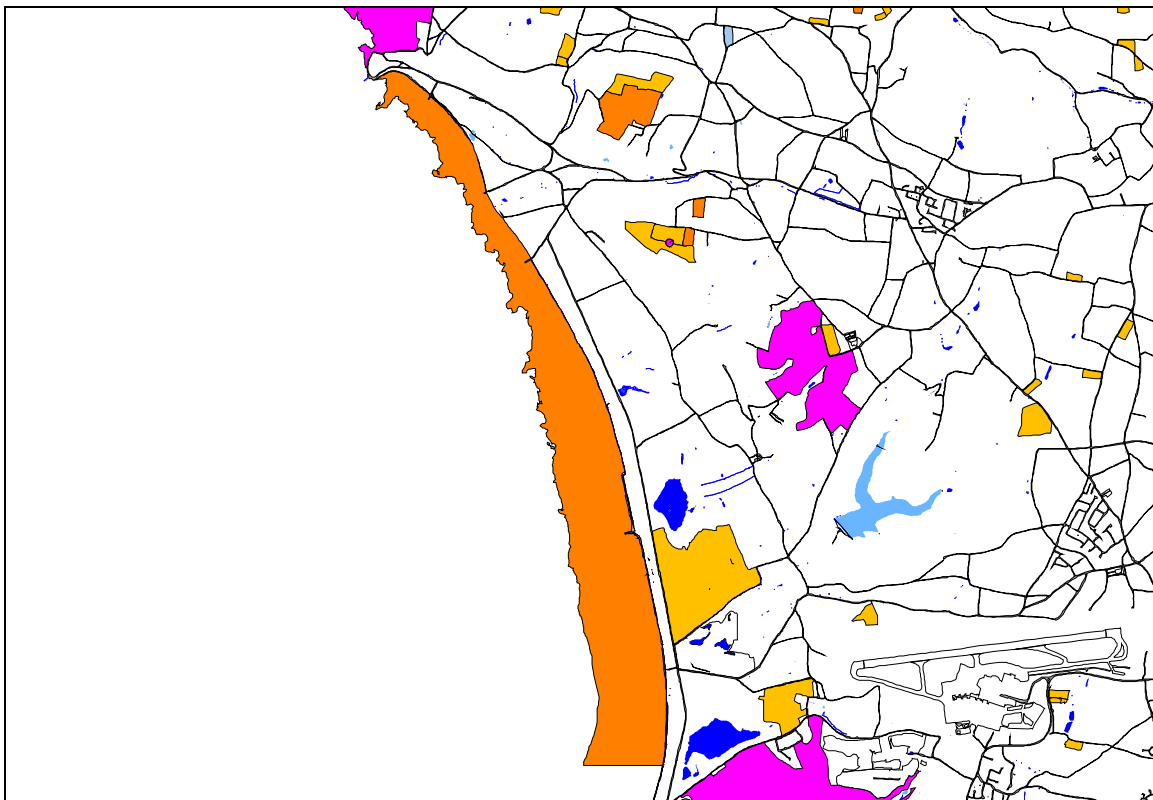
Plan of site of interest

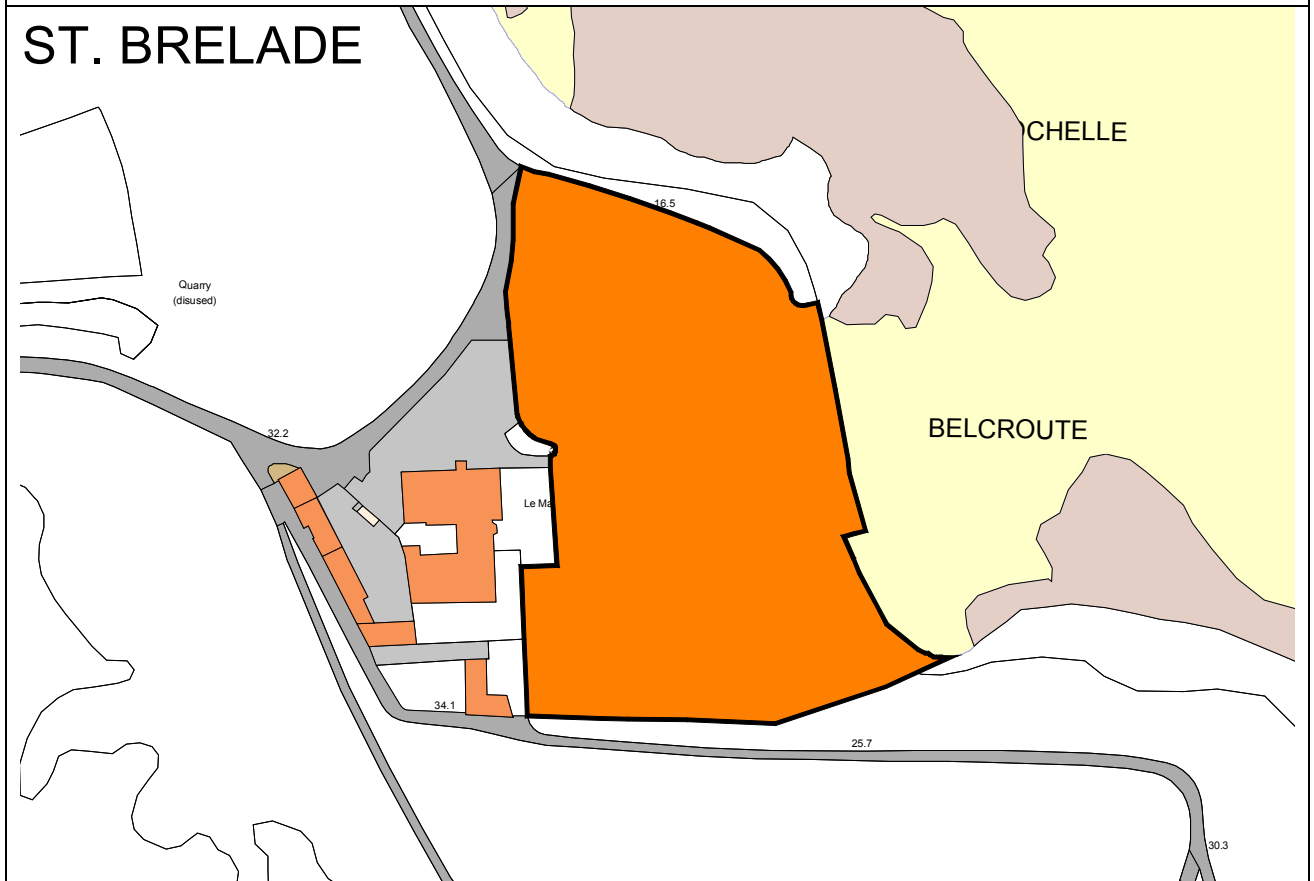

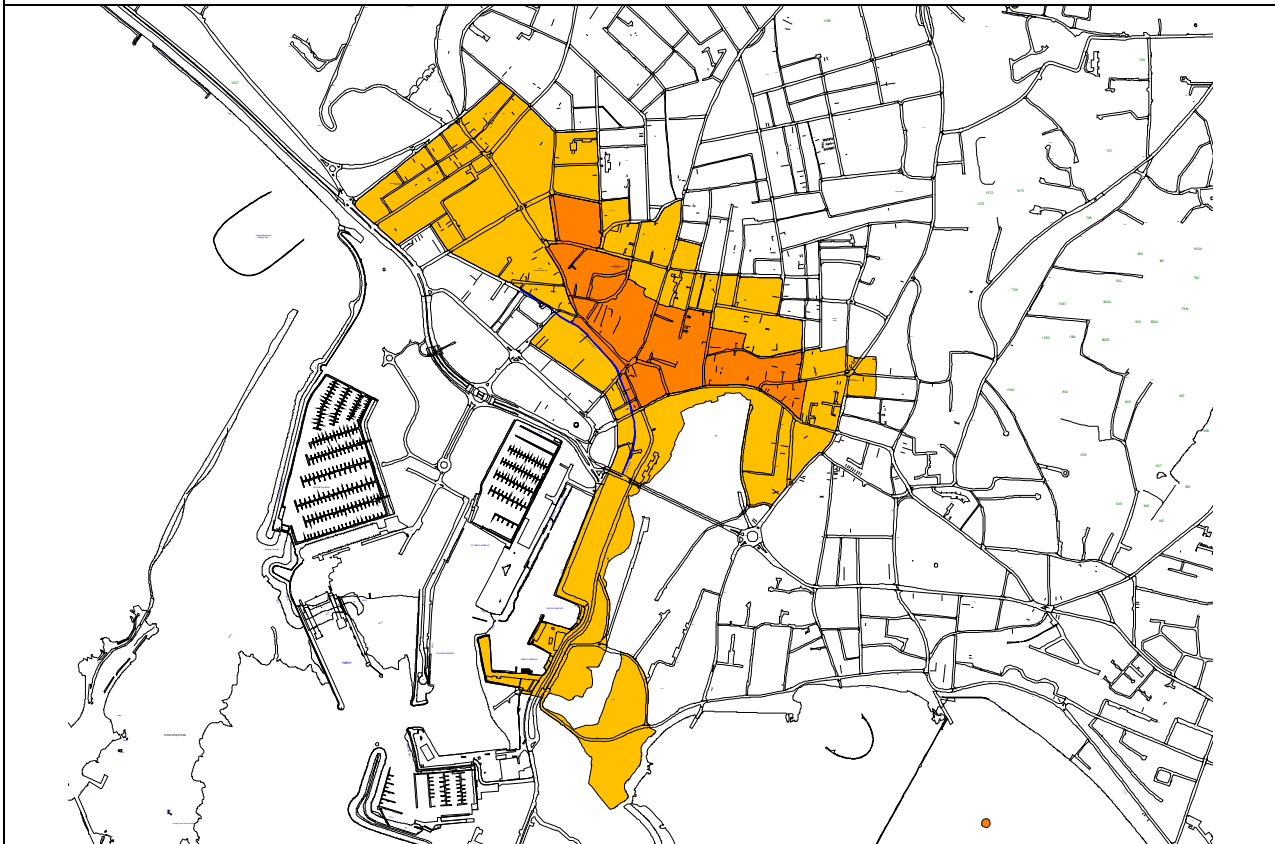

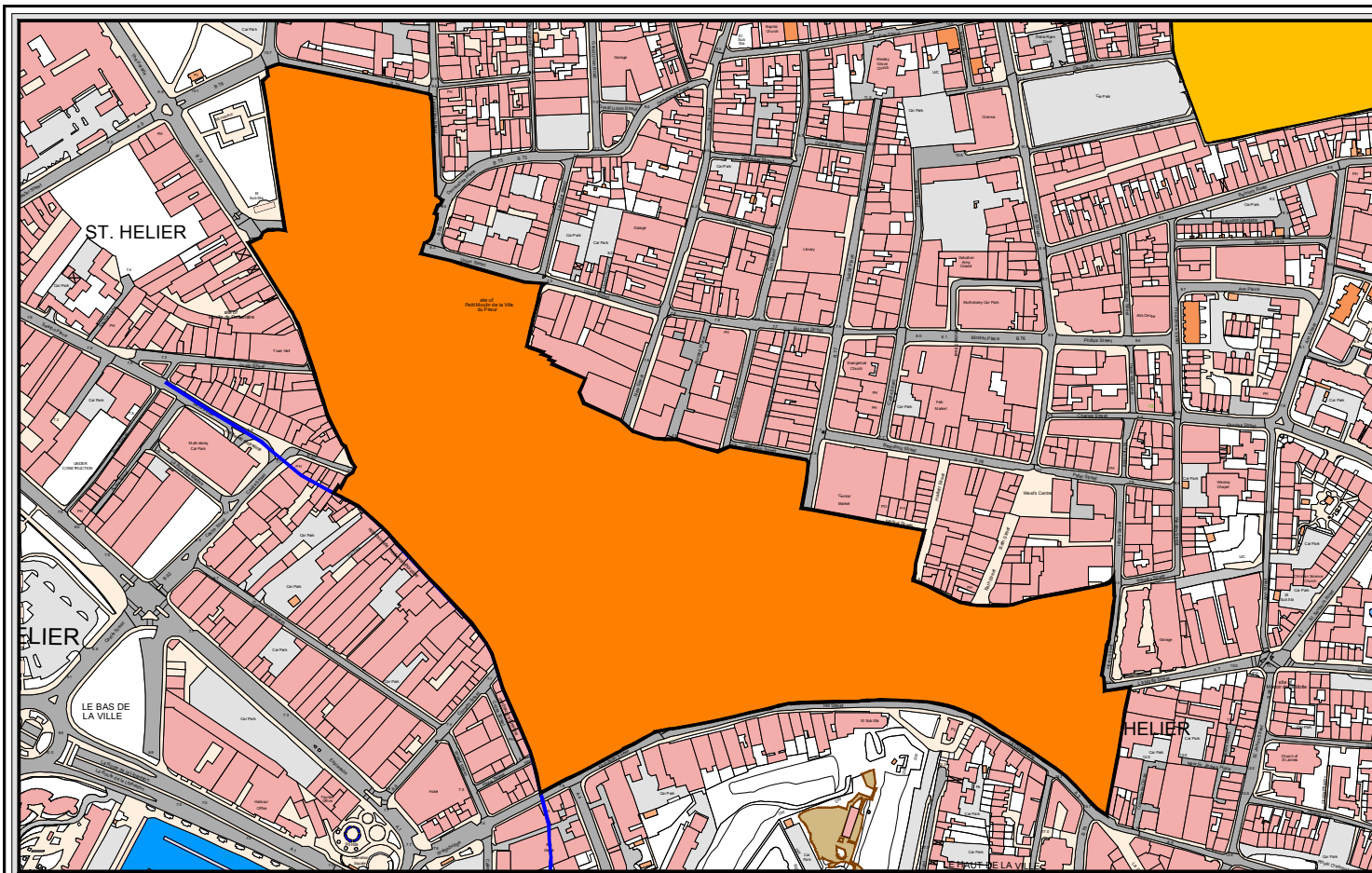

Archaeological interest	The AS core of town has been defined through reference to fieldwork carried out by Margaret Finlaison and others and drawn together in the report listed below. The area includes more than 30 sites where C13/C14 evidence has been found, as well as some Gallo-Roman and pre-Norman evidence. The southern boundary is defined by the medieval shoreline. The AAP is defined by areas of the historic town outside of the AS but shown as existing on the Richmond map of 1795. Also included within this area is the original historic harbour and area of fortifications stretching to La Collette.

Plan of site of interest





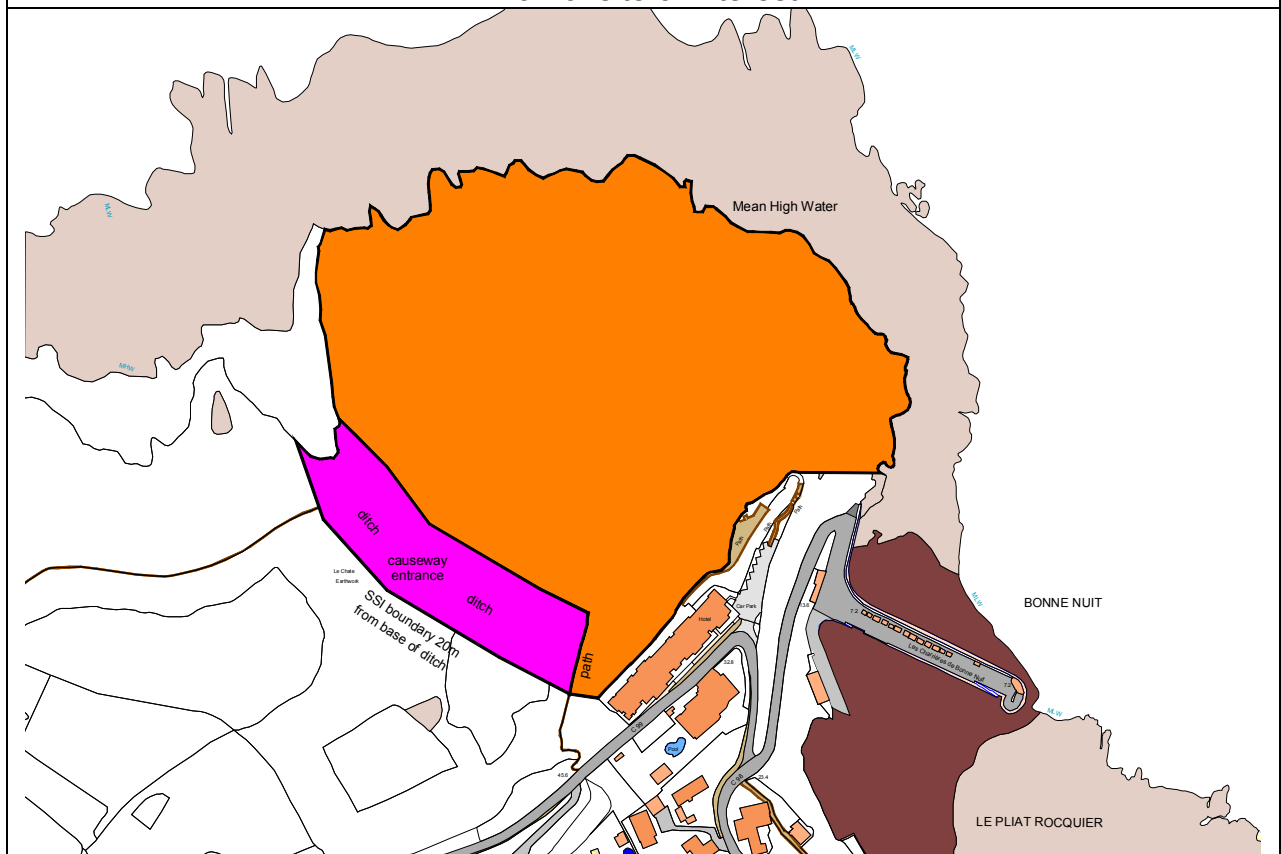

Traces of other works to the east which may pre-date the surviving earthworks.

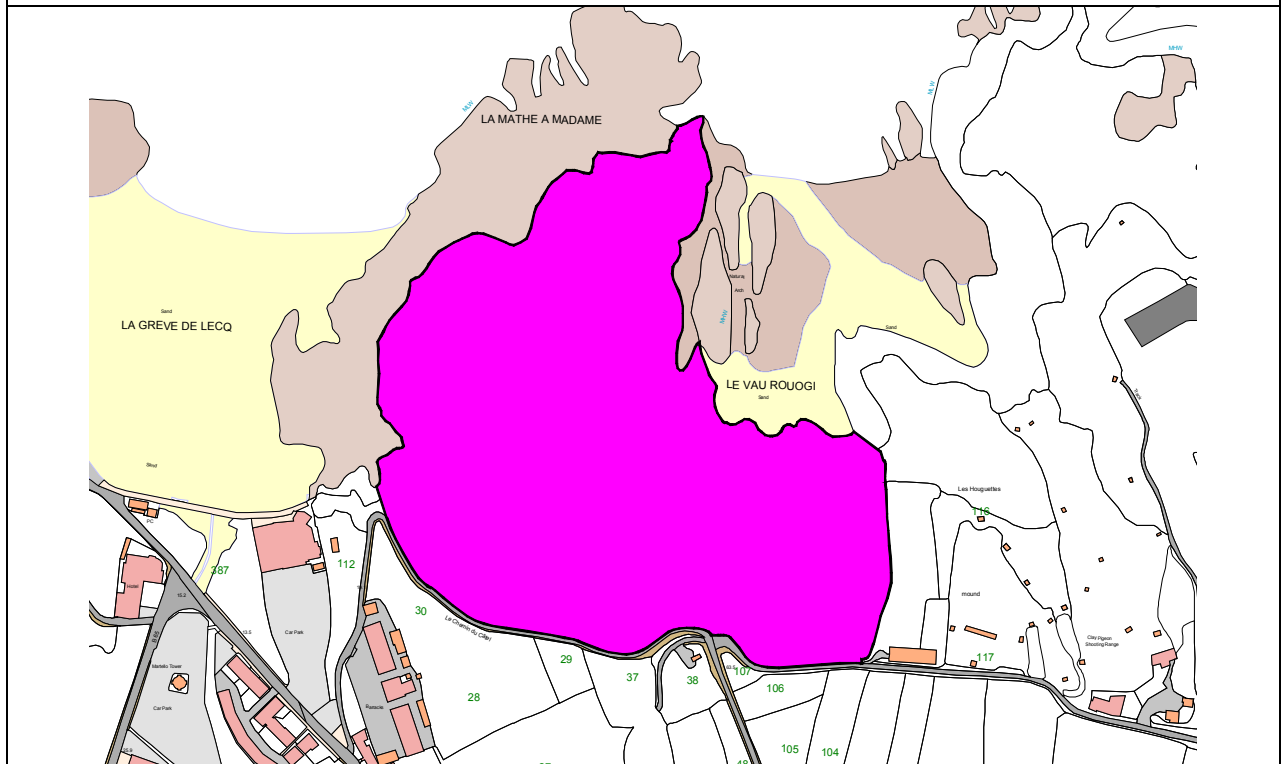

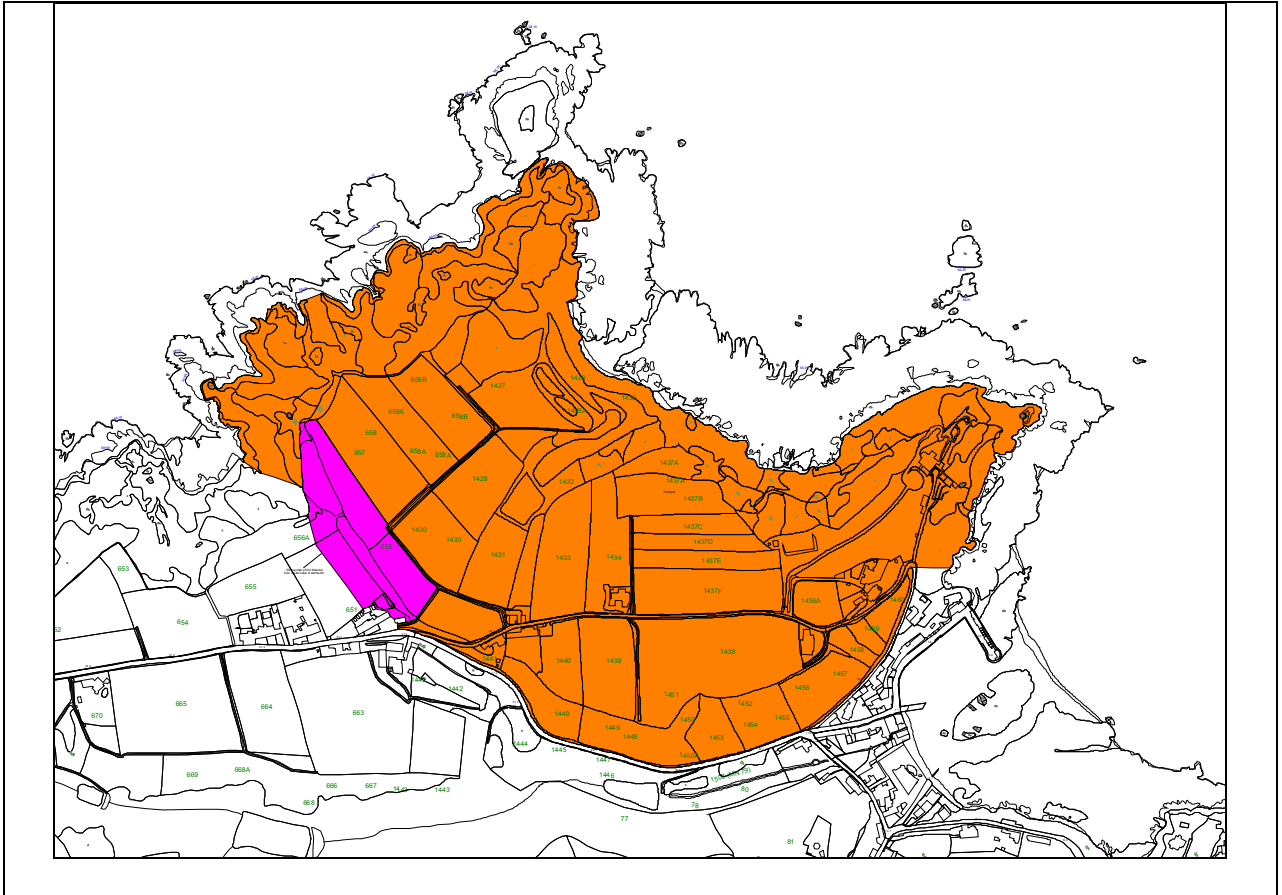

Archaeological interest	Prehistoric defensive earthwork & C18 fort. Defensive earthwork with at least 3 elements. Traces of terracing around the hill are evident and appear to cut at right angles by 2 later bank and ditch systems. The initial works would appear to be of Iron Age date and are comparable to Le C�tel de Rozel and Fr�mont earthworks. The semi-circular earthwork to the east is possibly medieval. There are likely to be traces of occupation or other activity both within and without the standing earthworks. This is a potentially important promontory fort. To the east are fields with large banked enclosures. The evolution of the site as a defensive stronghold continued into recent times with the building of Le C�tel de Lecq Fort on the western slopes in 1779. The fort comprises a gun battery with guardhouse, magazine and flanking screen walls with musket loopholes and a stone-roofed outwork or caponni�re to defend the entrance.

Archaeological interest	Large scale promontory fort, possibly multi-phase but including Iron Age 1000-100BC, and medieval phases, with occupation within the earthwork. The surviving monument is the northern part of a larger earthwork across the whole of Rozel Point. Evidence for Iron Age occupation comes from material recovered in field 1437A, and 4 coin hoards found within the earthwork close to Rozel bay. Roman coins have also been found. The earthwork is the largest surviving in Jersey. This is the prime candidate for the main Iron Age centre of Jersey and probably represents one of the few remaining sites where evidence of occupation through a series of periods may remain in context.

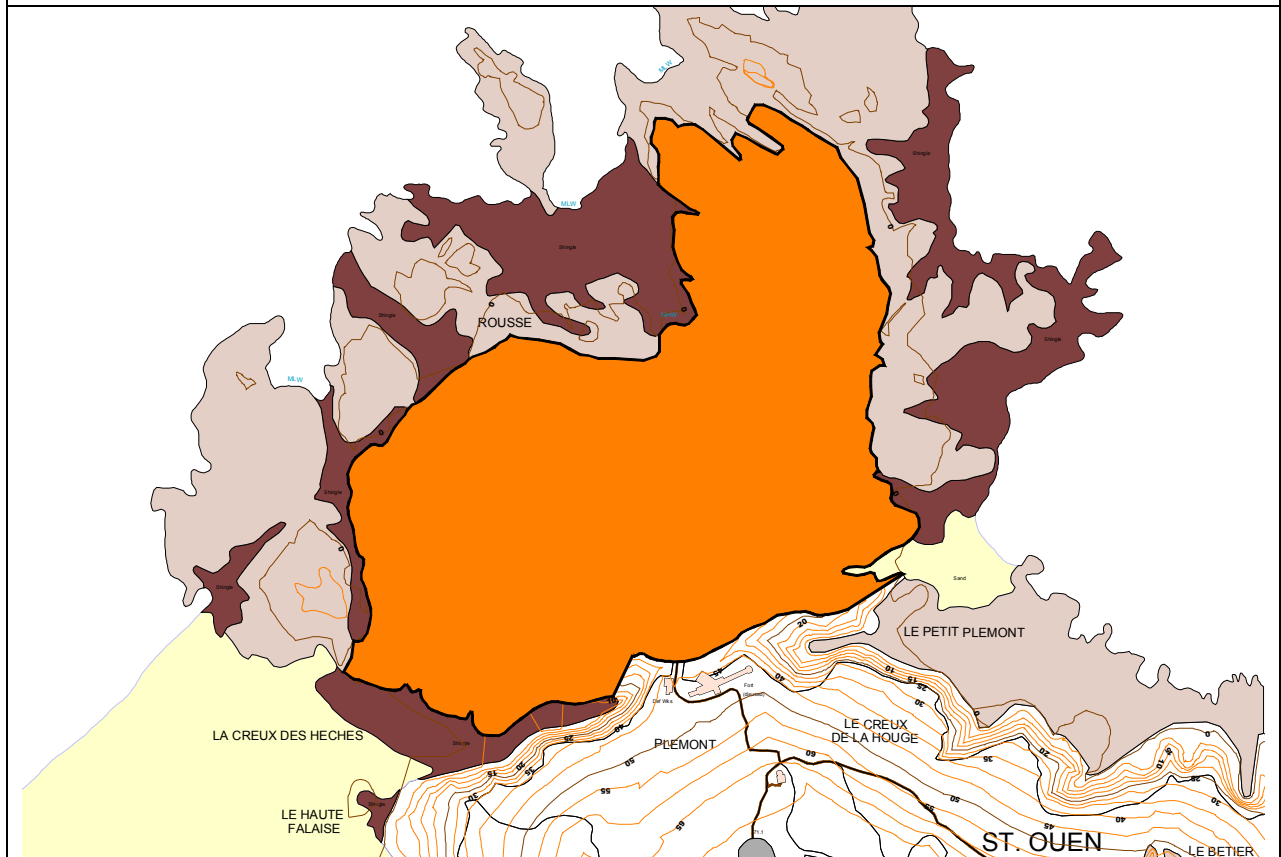

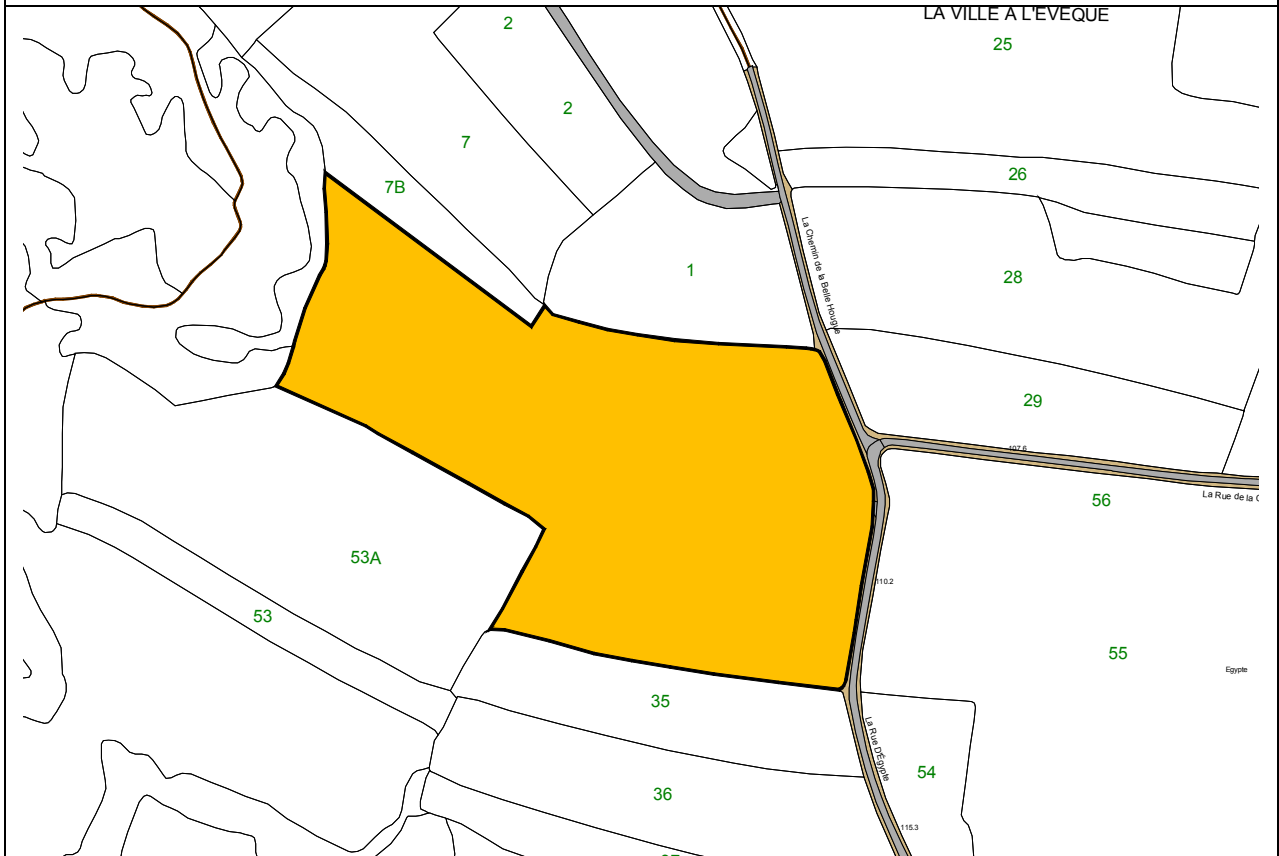
